



## This Month's Book Review



"Why Go to Church: the Drama of the Eucharist"



by Timothy Radcliffe, O.P.

Fr. Timothy Radcliffe, the 84<sup>th</sup> successor to St. Dominic, envisions the Mass as a drama in three acts under the headings, "Faith," "Hope," and" Love."

In contrast to the unfortunate feelings of many who see the Mass as boredom, Fr. Radcliffe sees the Mass as a "great event" whereby the liturgy "takes us by the hair and hurls us into the mystery of God." The book provides a strikingly fresh view of each movement and rubric contained in

the liturgy. He notes, for example, that "we do not go to remember an event that is simply past; we are touched by its present happening in our lives."

In the celebration of the Eucharist, it is as if "a veil is lifted and we are offered a glimpse of that 'impossible world' as we participate in each of the rubrics and elements that give form to the Mass; beginning with the Sign of the Cross, listening to the scriptural readings, our recitation of the Nicene Creed, etc. Each movement brings us "closer and closer to a deeper reality than can be experienced anywhere else."

Here in the Mass, we come "face to face with a meaning than cannot be imposed from without, but can only be discovered." Here we discover that "God comes to us as we are." The Mass revolves around us at all the stages of our human development, and that just as each of the Sacraments parallel our life span, the liturgy of the Mass has something to say to us at each of these stages in our growth —which is part of the drama that is the Mass!

In essence, the Mass "takes us through the crises and challenges of faith as it transforms us into the image of Christ and joins us to the Holy Family which is the Trinity."
